Conditional Sentences

Conditional Clause and Main Clause:

Ex: If I have enough money, I will go to Japan.

conditional clause main clause

Ex: I will go to Japan, if I have enough money.

main clause conditional clause

First, Second, and Third Conditionals:

1. If + Present Tense → will + inf

Ex: If you help me with the dishes (if + pres),

I will help you with your homework. (will + inf)

2. If + Past Tense → would + inf

Ex: If you knew her, you would agree with me.

3. If + Past Perfect Tense → would have + past participle

Ex: If you had helped me, I would have helped you.

The use of First, Second and Third If Conditionals:

• The type 1 conditional is used to refer to the present or future where the situation is real.

Ex: If you don't hurry, you will miss the train

• The type 2 conditional is used in situations will probably never happen at present or in future (unreal situations).

Ex: If I inherited a billion dollars, I would travel to the moon.

• The type 3 conditional is used to refer to the past and situations that did not happen in the past.

Ex: If you had studied harder, you would have passed your test. (but you didn't study hard, so you didn't pass your test).
